

Ice Fishing

Fishing for Men

There have been a lot of open doors since Covid and one of those has been ice fishing. The fishermen live in their own little world, so I thank the LORD for the opportunity to spend time with them. My friend and I would leave around 7AM & return late afternoon. No heat & no shelter during that period in very cold temps! We drove one hour by snowmobile through the mountains and then one more hour by dog sledge across the ice fjord (i.e., frozen water with icebergs). Then we made a hole in the ice and dropped our longline. The water is 600 meters deep, so we have to get our line to the bottom of the sea where the halibut live. In all, our line was over 800 meters long with over 100 hooks. Our last day out there, my friend took all his fishing equipment, that afternoon, the ice cracked up and 8 fishermen along with their 79 dogs were stranded on ice flows. The fishermen had to be rescued by helicopter.

We hope Covid restrictions lift, so we can visit the US, especially for our kids' sake. Our last trip was in 2017. In 16 years on the mission field, we've only been back for a total of 13 months.

Sixteen years ago, we moved to Iceland, because Greenland was closed. We hoped to live there for 7 years and then apply for citizenship, so we could move to Greenland, BUT GOD ... After 14 years in Greenland, I along with our 4 youngest are citizens of the Kingdom of Denmark! I was number 307 on the list of 3,000 names. It took almost 3 years to receive it. Carole should receive hers once the Danish Parliament meets to vote on the next list of potential citizens. Since Chip is over 18 years old, he has to apply for it himself which he plans to do. The young couple we mentioned in our last prayer letter has not missed a Sunday or Wednesday service this year. The woman is a product of our children's ministry. Someone invited her to attend when she was 17 years old. She kept coming and then brought her boyfriend. they are married and have two small children. They hang around after church for up to four hours & then come early on Wednesdays to eat with us.


We have had over 20 Natives the last few Wednesdays. Even though it is a children's ministry, adults attend. We have four adults, many teenagers, lots of children, toddlers and even a baby that attend. It makes for a loud and busy evening! It can be a challenge getting all the kids to sit, sing, memorize the Bible verses and listen to the short lessons...But With God All Things Are Possible!

We were thrilled to recently receive a phone call from another village requesting Gospel tracts. This is the second time and the second village we've sent tracts this past year.

Darkness


The dark period is quickly approaching. Every day we lose 9 more minutes of daylight. The sun will set for the year at the end of November. The sunshine has already been rare due to all the clouds and stormy weather we have recently had. The darkness does have an effect on minds. Suicide becomes a main focus this time of year. Each year the government throws more money into new programs, yet the high suicide rate continues.

Drug addiction is also a big problem in Greenland. People always ask, "How do drugs get there?" They are smuggled in via ship or plane. In the last few months, 3 men have died from smuggling drugs inside their bodies while flying. Drug and alcohol use contribute greatly to the high suicide rate.

Currently, the prisons are full in Greenland and there is a long waiting list. That means criminals live normal lives on the outside while they wait for an opening to serve their sentences.


The Glorious light of the Gospel of Christ is the only thing that can save this land!



The grocery stores have very little to offer, many houses are run down and the internet is very slow...and we love it! We need to get a missionary up here as well as to the other 70 towns and villages spread throughout the country.

Greetings from Greenland!

The Gospel Boat has not sailed to other villages since 2017. Two refurbished motors were installed, but we continued to run into problems. Since the missionary boat mechanic returned to the States, we decided to try and sell the boat. Last year, 3 different mechanics came to look at the boat. They all seemed eager to buy the boat until they saw the motors. The motor blocks are new, but all the other parts were the originals from 1979. Because of the condition of the motors, I could tell that we were not going to sell this boat nor sail the boat to other villages. Our boat ministry had come to a halt. This has caused a lot of discouragement which brought us to our knees. We have done a lot of praying over the last year asking God to give us clear direction.

Recently, a man in our church put me in contact with someone interested in the boat. Honestly, I was now cautious about selling the boat, because I did not want to be a bad testimony. I did not want someone blaming the missionary for selling them a dud. However, I figured once he saw the motors, he would no longer be interested. My sons and I got the motors ready to start on land. The man interested came to see the boat. The one motor had not been started for 2 years. When we started it up, an old previously welded part burst and water came gushing out into the boat. I was embarrassed, but thankfully, I had already told the man repeatedly that this was an old boat. I stammered around trying to figure out what to say at such an awkward moment. However, he beat me to it. He told me he was not interested in the motors. He said he just wants the boat! Wow! What an answer to prayer!

God placed an amount on our hearts to ask for the boat. Because of the motor problems, I figured that that amount would now be cut in half. However, when he asked what we expected for the boat, I decided to throw out the amount God put on our hearts. I waited for a counter offer. To our surprise, he responded with, "It's a deal!" Praise the LORD!

Here is what we are praying about now. There is a brand-new boat already in stock in the capital city of Nuuk. It would meet our needs perfectly. It has one motor that can be serviced right here in town by authorized boat mechanics. With the money from the sale of the Gospel Boat and the money already in our boat fund, we would have enough for a down payment.

Even though the Gospel Boat has been out of commission for the past 4 years, the Great Commission still burns in our hearts, and we are excited to once again launch out and reach these unreached villages with the Gospel of Jesus Christ!

"Troubled on every side"

A faithful couple in our church has recently moved to Denmark because the wife was very sick. The doctors here would not help her, so she booked a flight to Denmark. She then went to the hospital where they admitted her and immediately gave her four pints of blood. She has been diagnosed with cancer and is undergoing treatment.

One of our church teens was attacked by a dog last month. Someone helped get the dog off of her leg, but a lady driving by refused to give the girl a lift to the hospital because of Covid. Eventually, a taxi took her to the hospital where she needed 30 plus stiches. She is fine now.

Another teen who never misses church was absent on Sunday. She had attempted suicide and was in the hospital. We visited and prayed with her. She is 13 years old and comes from a broken home with a lot of abuse. **A** woman who briefly attended our church several years ago before moving to Denmark just recently committed suicide. When talking to the teens, every one of them said they had attempted suicide at least once. Suicide is an epidemic in the Arctic, but praise God we have the cure!

Praise the LORD a supply ship finally made it through the ice in April. The shelves in our grocery stores were bare and it took about 3 more ships before they were fully stocked again. The supply ship comes every week during the summer months.

Jonathan is now a musher. He and I go dog sledging several times a week and will continue while the snow remains. Our family has always wanted a dog team, but it's just too expensive. Now we get to exercise my friend's dogs and take care of them while he supplies the food. What a deal! We also give him a hand whenever he needs it. Like recently, when he asked us to go ice fishing with him. The LORD is good!

Another friend of mine asked me to help coach basketball to teenage boys. Jonathan, Chip & I have another good opportunity to meet more people. One of the teenage boys used to attend our services years ago.

Ministry Update

Continue to pray about our boat ministry. There are still some issues with the motors. Sadly, we have not visited any towns or villages with the Gospel Boat since 2017. However, we have been able to visit a few towns and villages by hitching a ride with friends.

We are in the beginning stages of another ministry opportunity. A friend of ours who operates an Internet radio station for his church (one of our supporting churches) is in the process of setting us up with our own. This will extend our reach even further. Praise the LORD!

Thanks to Chip, our teen activity has grown over the last few months with some attending on Sundays. He invites his students to church and church activities. Kids ask him lots of questions in the classroom giving him ample opportunities to witness. He sees firsthand the broken homes these children come from and he is burdened for them. Anna & Emilia are always busy with nursery, reaching out to teenage girls, or baking something for the ministry. Their mom has taught them well! I thank God for my family as they are vital to the ministry here!





Ministry Update

An estimated 70% of our town contacted covid over the last two months. Chip got it from the school and had to take a week off from teaching. Even though the symptoms were very mild this time around, everyone in town had to wear masks and Corona passports were again required for most activities. Thankfully, the passports and the masks have since been dropped.

Our Sunday attendance dipped a little, but things are back to normal now. I am holding a Bible study with a man in the church and looking for others interested, so we can turn it into a midweek prayer meeting. One teenage girl's father died last week, but she was still in church on Sunday. Pray for her and the other teens. Tonight, we get back to our regular Friday night teen activities.

One boy who used to attend but moved away said he missed church and singing songs with us. He sent me some Gospel songs (in English) on YouTube and asked me if I had ever heard them before. We love hearing from those we have ministered to. It's always an encouragement and a blessing!

Winter

In late December, most of our snow blew away and it was our first "not so white" Christmas. However, things have changed since then. We have had lots of snow with cold temperatures. Two villages south of us no longer have running water, because the pipes to the lakes froze solid.

Here in Ilulissat, we have had windchills down to minus 30 for the last 2 weeks. However, that has not stopped our youth from walking to church on Sundays!

I have not done any ice fishing yet this year, but hopefully soon. One of my friends has invited me to go hunting for Narwhal and Beluga. I thought ice fishing was cold, but being in a boat during the winter is the coldest I have ever been.

We are thankful that the sun has returned & has now peaked the mountains giving us some needed sunshine each day.

Pandemic

There were more murders the first week of January than all of last year combined. Most murders are alcohol related. Because of Covid, many towns and villages stopped the sale of alcohol without any prior warning. The police quickly noticed a drop in calls. Each weekend was very peaceful. However, some began making home brew and selling it on Facebook. The police have been tracking them down.

Sadly, the sale of alcohol resumed yesterday & the police had a very busy night. Every single call to the police was alcohol related and it wasn't even the weekend! This Arctic pandemic has been going on for years and is the cause of most of Greenland's social problems including the high rate of suicide, domestic abuse & child abuse. The government gets rich from the sale of alcohol while families suffer and become poor. Ministering to alcoholics has been a part of our ministry over the years whether dealing with them in the church, in their homes or in the local prison. Many of our church teens come from these homes. The Gospel of Christ can end this pandemic!

Ministry

The work has grown over the past couple months. We are averaging over 15 Natives each Sunday and 20 in our children's ministry. Several that come are folks that used to come years ago and have now started attending again. There have also been many first-time visitors since our return from the States.

Last year, the LORD opened up the door for our ministry to use the mini gymnasium in the school where Chip works. Every Friday, we open it up to our faithful children and teens. This has provided some really good bonding time with the young people. Our most faithful teens also help with the weekly cleaning of the church building. What an answer to prayer to see folks getting involved!

Recently, we had another first -Natives giving money to help with the church expenses! To some, the small amount given would be laughable, but not to us! This is a big step in the right direction! In this socialistic society, people are accustomed to taking and few ever learn to give. A pioneer work is a very slow process and we rejoice in any growth we see, no matter how small it may seem! With God All Things Are Possible! **B**efore it got too cold, we were having furnace problems and had to call someone to come look at it. The fourth guy finally diagnosed the problem. Before he even looked at the furnace, he started asking me questions about what Baptists believe. I am not sure if I paid for that hour of his time, but am sure glad for the opportunity to share the Gospel with him!

Emilia celebrated her Sweet 16 birthday. Thank you for the birthday wishes and cards. means a lot to our children.

Anna has started driving lessons & hopes to get her license soon. Chip is still teaching in the public school here, while taking online Bible college courses.

Jonathan has started working with the girls at the fish factory. He loves to earn money. especially this time of year, so he can buy everyone gifts.

Matti loves to borrow and beg for money, because she too loves to "buy" everyone Christmas gifts. © Children truly are a blessing and heritage of the LORD!

Last month. Greenland had its first ever Corona related death. Since then, there has been an increase in Covid infections all over the country. The virus has even reached to several outlying villages, infecting around 20% of the population living in those remote places. Overnight, the health minister imposed new restrictions for the entire country that are in effect until March of next year. He also warns that we will be dealing with Covid for years to come. Thankfully, for now, we are able to continue our ministries as usual without any restrictions. Please keep praying that this pandemic will soon end.

Lights in the Dark

The sun set in November and it is once again the dark time of year for us. However, we enjoy all the Christmas lights & decorations that help brighten up the town. We also enjoy seeing the many Christmas trees around town that have been shipped in from Norway. As we say in Danish, "Det er så hyggeligt!"

Going Back



A corona passport is required for certain activities, but this should not affect our church services.

It has been a blessing for our children to spend so much time with their grandparents, uncles, aunts & cousins. Chip was able to get his scuba diving certification. The next step for him is diving in cold waters. Anna is praying about her future. She has been working in a little fish factory, but she does not want to make a career out of it. Emilia. Jonathan & Matti will be jumping back into school upon our return to Greenland.

People think abortion is just what you do. When you tell them abortion is murder, they have no idea what you are talking about. They are brainwashed at a very young age. It breaks our hearts each time a teenager or even preteen talks to Carole about their abortion experience. They have no one to talk to about the psychological pain it has caused them. Some have contemplated suicide as a means to remove the pain. Yet, young girls are still taught to experiment with their bodies and then pressured by doctors and even their parents to have abortions. Greenland has gone so far that politicians want to bring the number of abortions down. They say they do not want to interfere with a woman's right to choose, yet the number of abortions trouble them.

Our faithful young couple has yet to miss a church service or activity this year. It makes preaching more exciting & easier when I know the same people will be there every service. We are teaching the simple stories of the Bible, yet no one here has ever heard them before.

Since this couple has returned to Ilulissat, they have not been able to find a place to live. They have been living with family & friends, but there is just not enough room. Now they are living in an apartment with 11 other people. It is NOT a good situation, especially with their 2 small children.

They have decided to move back to Nuuk if nothing becomes available in the next couple weeks. Will you please pray with us that God will open up an apartment for them?

They have told us on many occasions that we need to move with them to Nuuk, so we can start the Baptist church there. However, there is no one here to take the church in Ilulissat. nor anyone to send to Nuuk to start a church there, but what an open door! The harvest truly is great, but the labourers are few!

White Already to Harvest

Our children's club has been growing with adults over the last month. We have been averaging 5 Native adults each week with first time visitors every Wednesday over the last month. One is the wife of the store manager of the grocery store in town. Her husband said he can supply us with bread, fruit and pastries once a month to help with our ministry.

One of our men has promised to go along with me into the local prison to assist with the music. Another answered prayer!

We are excited about what is taking place in our various ministries! However, we are planning a trip back to the States which is always done with mixed emotions. We have not seen our family in 4 years, yet we hate to leave the work here unattended. Each time we leave, it feels like we have to start all over again when we return. We are praying for someone to sit the ministry here while we are away. For this reason, our trip to the States will be another short one.

Christopher, Jr. (Chip) is just finishing up his first semester of Bible college online. Doing school while working full time at the local bakery has been quite a challenge. Every year we pray that this will be the year that the LORD gives a great increase!

Back in early August we spent a week in Kangerlussuag. stayed in a summer hut with no running water and no plumbing. When we went to town to buy food, it was a 5 km walk each It reminded us of the good ole days when we first arrived to Greenland! We also did some hunting. Chip shot his first muskox & Jonathan shot his first reindeer which the natives call Tuttu. It is a big deal in Greenland for a 13-yearold to shoot his very first tuttu. It is the beginning of manhood and Jonathan did not disappoint with one shot through the heart. Chip guided us up mountains, through a snowstorm & right to the reindeer. We walked a total of 31 km on that day!

While in Kangerlussuaq, we were able to meet up with some of our friends as well as make some new friends. We even bumped into the Prime Minister at the local grocery store.

A Native friend said to me that since we have lived in Greenland so long and fish & hunt that we are now 75% native. A key to getting people to listen to the Gospel on the mission field is by accepting their culture and not bashing it.


The Gospel Boat

Thankfully, there were 2 people in town that immediately called me. A friend used his boat to pull the boat off the iceberg. Praise the LORD there was no damage. Chip was the temporary captain as Captain Steve Nissley (Aka Pop-pop the sailor man) could not be with us due to the coronavirus. We are praying that next year we will be able to visit villages again.

Polar Bear Patrol

It is that time of year in East Greenland when the polar bears begin to visit Ittoqqortoormiit and run between the houses. One man has started voluntarily patrolling early in the mornings. He rides a snowmobile through town to make sure no one meets a polar bear on the way to school or to work. He is not allowed to shoot the bears, so he scares them away shooting around them. He is hoping the law soon changes, so hunters can shoot the bears without first getting permission from the local authorities.





Right now, there doesn't even look like there is a place available in the harbor to anchor the Gospel Boat. We ask you to pray that we can get the Boat in the water and find a place to anchor. On this pioneer mission field, everything we do is always a first. Sailing and anchoring in the harbor will be a first for Chip and I! So many times, the tasks have seemed daunting. Yet as we have experienced over and over again, With God All Things Are Possible!

The Pioneer work here is very slow. From time to time, it can be easy to get discouraged, yet it is always encouraging to see God working in the hearts and lives of people. One man asked me if we could get him some Bible verses, so he could read one every day to his family. We compiled 100 different verses in Greenlandic and printed them out for him. God's Word will not return void!

Last year, we translated the B-I-B-L-E into Greenlandic. This song quickly became a favorite. Even the parents tell us that the song plays in their heads all day long. Last week, a four-year old boy asked for a Bible. He wants to start bringing his Bible to church, so he can sing the B-I-I-B-I-L-I!

Jonathan has been entertaining a neighborhood boy since January. They have spent many hours together playing inside and outside. The boy often eats with us. He started coming to our kids' club and then his parents dropped in for a visit at church. Pray for this family and others as we continue to build relationships & make inroads.

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Prison Ministry

The local prison remains closed to visitors due to COVID-19. It has been 2 months since we held our last service in there. However, I recently got a message from yet another former inmate thanking me for holding services in the prison. I could not remember him until I checked my records. He was in the prison 5 years ago! The prison only holds around 20 inmates at one time, yet over the last 8 years, we have given the Gospel to hundreds that have since been released. It is always encouraging to hear from them and know that our labor is not in vain in the LORD.

Mother's Day

When we first arrived Greenland 13 years ago, hardly anyone celebrated Valentine's Day or Mother's Day. Over the last few years, these holidays have become popular with real flowers flown in and sold in the local stores. We held a special Mother's Day service & had 25 Natives in attendance this year!

We were invited out to play basketball with Filipinos & Greenlanders that work in the local fish factories. It has now become a weekly event.

Because of the border closures, a local fisherman has asked for my help in catching Ammassat. In addition to all this, Brother Wright has been working on the Gospel Boat & LORD willing, we will be sailing again this summer! Praise the LORD!





Prison Ministry

Pray for our prison ministry. From time to time, Danes will end up in our local prison. Since they are strangers in a foreign land, we always seem to quickly build a friendship with them. One Dane told me he missed Reese's peanut butter cups. Peanut butter cups are a rare find outside the US. Carole just happened to have one 3 pack that she was rationing. She told me to give it to that inmate. Sometimes it can take a long time to break through to people, but it is amazing how one act of kindness can instantly open up doors. You should have seen that inmate's face when I gave him that pack of peanut butter cups! After that, I had his attention. I could talk to him about anything! I gave him a bundle of Danish tracts to take with him when he left Greenland. The LORD repaid Carole ten-fold with peanut butter cups!

A former inmate who now lives in the capital city of Nuuk, recently asked me to send him our Greenlandic tracts. Pray for fruit as he hands out these Gospel tracts.

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Answered Prayer

Thank you for praying about our son's residency. After waiting almost a year, Chip finally got an answer back from Danish He now has immigration. permanent residency!!!

Quarantine

Covid-19 has reached Nuuk, The country will Greenland. now officially shut down Friday at midnight. All flights in and out of the country will be stopped as well as flights to other villages and towns. Traveling to other villages by dog sledge, snowmobile or boat will also be prohibited. Schools will be closed as well as all government offices.

The quarantine is affecting our ministries. The prison has shut down to visitors, so we can no longer hold services in there. Pray that we can still be a light that shineth in a dark place during this pandemic. Many people are afraid which makes more opportunities for sharing the Gospel with them.

Boat Update

The heat pipes that run to the septic tank under the church have frozen. We have had prolonged temps of -35° & it was just too much for our pipes. Pray that we can quickly get the pipes & the septic tank thawed. On a happier note, the sun has returned to Ilulissat. The days are getting longer and brighter! Spring is just around the corner, only another five months! We just sent a bundle of

Greenlandic tracts to a friend in Denmark who regularly meets Greenlanders while out street preaching & distributing tracts. Pray that God uses this man & these tracts to reach folks there.

The US plans to open a consulate in Nuuk, Greenland. The US had previously opened one in 1940 during the Nazi occupation of Denmark, but it was closed in 1953.

Each year, a council approves new words for the Greenlandic language. Greenland now has its own word for "Fake News," "Nutaarsiassat salluliuutit."

Pray for Gage & Aleah Gilbert who are currently on deputation for Greenland. They plan to move to Ilulissat and work in our ministry until they can go off on their own.

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Last month, a polar bear was spotted on the outskirts of a village in East Greenland. The game warden was called early in the morning & hurried out on his snowmobile towards the frozen sea. The polar bear was now headed towards the village. The game warden came within 90 feet of the polar bear. He then fired a warning shot. At first the polar bear did not even react, but then he slowly turned & wandered away. That's when the real problems began! It was dark, so the warden used his flashlight to find the trail back to the village. When he stopped, he heard the ice cracking and starting to give way under the snowmobile. He tried to drive as fast as he could, but it just sped up the breaking of the ice. In a last ditched effort to save himself, he sprang from his snowmobile and tried to land on some firm ice. Unfortunately, he landed into the freezing waters. He called for help. A man who had been watching from shore grabbed some rope from his dog sledge and was able to pull him out of the water after three long minutes. The warden's legs were stiff and he could not walk for a while, but he was thankful to be alive!

Please pray about the Boat ministry. Obviously, we did not expect to have so many problems with the installation of the 2 motors. We need direction moving forward. We could use a boat mechanic or mechanics to help us get the motors running and then to visit the villages with us each summer. It would be good to have a mechanic onboard at all times to help in case of engine problems. The other option is to get an upgrade and buy a boat & motors that are used and serviced here. We want to be wise stewards of God's money.

Thank you for remembering our different ministries in prayer. The attendance is steady in our children & teen's ministry, Kunngip Klubbia. Recently. there were some new inmates in the prison that heard the Gospel for the first time.

It then knocked one man over and bit his face while trying to crush his skull. The polar bear then attacked the second hunter & bit his head while the hunter held onto the bear's neck. The third hunter went after his gun & fired a shot at the bear. The angry bear looked up at him ready to charge, but the hunter shot again, this time hitting the polar bear in the paw. The polar bear The men finished ran awav. field dressing their muskox and arrived home the following day. The police told them to go to the hospital. All three are fine!



Ministry

The attendance in each of our ministries has been very good over the last couple months. We have seen many visitors. There were 18 Natives in one of our Sunday services. children's ministry which also includes teens and adults is usually well attended. We had over 10 in attendance at one of our prison services with several guards listening in as preached. Please pray for all these precious souls that hear the Gospel in their own tongue. Thank you for being a part of this ministry for so many years. Many of you remember when we first arrived to this pioneer mission field. We arrived without knowing the languages, without housing, without any Gospel literature, without any friends and without any ministries, but With God All Things Are Possible!

Kangerlussuaq

Kangerlussuaq or "Big Fjord" has a population of 500 and is home to one of two international airports in Greenland. This unique town unlike any other in the country was first founded as a US military base during WW2. Though the Americans have been gone for decades, their buildings, roads airport still remain. Greenland will soon start construction on 3 new international airports with one being in Ilulissat. The Danish Joint Arctic Command plans to keep Kangerlussuaq open. They are responsible for patrolling Greenland and for Search and Rescue.

Kangerlussuaq is also home to musk-ox and reindeer hunting. Chip, Pop-pop and I enjoyed a memorable hunting trip & shot 3 reindeer. We had 10 tags, but had to carry the meat out on our backs in mountainous terrain. We did not get a muskox, so we have to go back next year. However, we made friends with a native couple. We hit it off so well that they shipped us dried fish and muskox meat through the mail. The LORD provides again! Check out our blog to read more about our hunt.

Bro. Wright has been a big help. He has spent countless hours ensuring we got the motors and parts at the best prices.

Will you take part?

Our oldest child Christopher (Chip) is now a high school graduate. He has a servant's heart & has been my righthand man in the ministry for years. Pray as he seeks the LORD's will for his future. He has grown up on the mission field and not had the privilege & exposure of being around other men of God.

Because of this, we are asking pastors, other men of God, and those that know him personally to send a short note or video (via email) with words of wisdom or Scriptural challenge. We understand that time is precious, but if you are able to do this, it will mean a lot to us and will certainly impact Christopher. We will present the notes & videos to him when we celebrate his graduation.



One of the towns that we have visited several times with the Gospel Boat is *Qasigiannguit*. It is located 60 km south of Ilulissat on the other side of the ice flow. It has a population of 1,000 & is home to a boarding school for teens continuing their education past the 10th grade. There is no airport, but one can take a helicopter roundtrip (weather permitting) for \$800. Since the town is so remote, the cost of housing is much cheaper than here. We have desired for years to start preaching stations in remote towns and villages. There is currently a 2,000 sq. ft. building for sale. If purchased, this building would be our first preaching station and give us a foothold into this town. could easily hold church services in the summer with our boat ministry. This town could be another base from where to launch out even further.

So many opportunities on this pioneer mission field!

Ministry

Kunngip Klubbia, our children's ministry, we spent a couple months going step by step though the Gospel message using visuals. It amazes us how attentive the children can be at times. Other times, when we have over 20 Native children, it can get crowded and hectic, but the kids always leave with a Bible verse in their hearts, a message on their minds and a song on their tongues.

The pioneer work is a slow process. There always seems to be someone coming around for us to minister to. However, we have learned though experience that our time with them can be short. Many times, people lose interest and drift away. Other times people move away. There were some coming around regularly for months, but once again, family pulled them away. Now we have the opportunity to spend time with another family on a regular basis. Pray for souls in Greenland. The true Gospel is so foreign to these people who have been steeped in false religion for centuries.

Our Jeep is running again on all cylinders. It left us sit for 2 weeks, during which we had to walk one mile each way to the church building. It reminded us of our early days before we had a car. We sure appreciate all the time we save by driving.

In January, a trawler broke a sea cable that brings high speed internet to our town. Now our internet is operating at dial-up speed. A ship from Canada has been hired along with divers to fix the broken cable sometime in March. We will update our blog once the sea cable is repaired.

In January, a baby was stillborn via C-section. A brokenhearted mother buried baby's coffin. A few days later she was called to a meeting by the doctor and town priest informing her that they forgot to put the body in the coffin.

Suicides in Greenland are still statistically very high. former inmate who attended our services while in prison and several times out of prison was another victim to suicide.

Carole Ann has counseled a young girl who is dealing with guilt over a past abortion. A lot of people are dealing with guilt over sin. Please pray for them to understand God's forgiveness.

Over the last 6 months, we have had over 65 different children and teens attend the children's ministry. Pray for these young ones. We would like to see their parents come to church. Unfortunately, their parents sometimes forbid them from coming. One man I've known for years was just asking me the other day how our church was doing. He then told me that his daughter came one time to the Baptist Church and said she had a lot of fun, but he told her not to go again. My wife and I remember the day she came...5 years ago! She never did come back. The State Church sure has a hold on people.

Many have been invited to our Sunday services, yet few get the courage to attend. However, we are busy Monday through Saturday entertaining or visiting with Natives.

We have had some good services in the prison over the last several months. The prison has a new warden. The former warden always welcomed our ministry in the prison. We pray & anticipate the same from the new warden.

Continue praying for the Wright family as they adapt to this foreign culture and study two foreign languages.





Can God?

The Wright family has arrived to Ilulissat! They have had a time trying to find housing. They are currently living in an apartment block among the people. We had "fun" getting their belongings from harbor to the church. No one could move the 40ft. container, so we had to empty everything using a vehicle and repack it into another container. A man I know, generously let us rent his flatbed truck. It would have taken days to empty that container using our Jeep. (3) It is awesome to see God provide! **A**s I drove JR around town getting him registered and set up with his social security #'s, bank account, PO box, etc., it reminded me of when we first arrived. I am still amazed how God brought us through those first few months and years. We arrived not knowing anyone, had no car, no church, no ministry, no one to help us...No one, but God! You can imagine how thrilled we are to be helping the Wrights. We are leaving for 3 weeks to visit missionaries in Denmark and Norway & to visit friends from Greenland. The Wrights will oversee the ministry. They are nervous, but With God All Things are Possible!

Suffer the Children

Kunngip Klubbia, the children's ministry is now back in full swing. Over 40 different children attended this past They have learned month. verses like John 3:16 & have repeatedly heard the Gospel in their own tongue. As a result, many of these children have started attending the services on Sundays. Pray as we follow up to reach their parents.

A man who has been attending our prison services for a long time asked me for a Bible after clearly being moved by the preaching of God's Word. Pray for this man and many others who are hearing the Gospel message for the very first time. New inmates always find it funny the first time they see and hear a preacher preaching the Word of God with authority. Yet, time and time again, I have seen inmates go from mocking and laughing in one service to showing respect in the next service. To see them sitting and listening attentively to God's Word is something I will never grow tired of. Thank you for partnering with us to do the Impossible!

Thankfully, that has changed! In April, a group of four came from the Mt. Zion Baptist Church of Denver, PA to knock out some walls and remodel our "auditorium." This group came to work, and did they ever work! They worked long hours and transformed our once tiny cramped room into a beautiful place to worship the LORD. Our seating capacity has been doubled. We pray now that we can fill every seat! Thank you, Bro. & Sister Davis, Caleb & Jared for your sacrifice in helping this pioneer work in Ilulissat, Greenland! In Everything Give Thanks

Last flooded year, sewage underneath our church building from a broken town sewer pipe. This year, a pipe broke under our house and flooded the crawl space with sewage. My son and I have pumped out a lot of the sewage, and now we must go in under the house to remove the sludge. Most of the gray water has frozen and in some places is a foot thick! The whole town has been experiencing similar problems due to the cold temperatures. Even the school had to close down because of broken pipes. There is a long waiting list to get repairs done. The pipe that broke under our house has heat cable on it, but it apparently was not working properly. Please pray as we clean this mess up. We are getting good at, but tired of sewage cleanup!

Lost at Sea

North Greenland was hit hard in one devastating weekend. A couple from Ilulissat was sailing with their son and a relative when their boat hit some ice. The three adults were thrown overboard, leaving the 12 year old all alone. After 3 hours of crying for help over the radio, he was finally rescued. Search and rescue only found two of the bodies.

A day later, an earthquake caused part of a mountain to crumble into the sea that sent a tsunami into several villages. One village was completely destroyed. A family of three was swept away as they slept in their home. Another person was also swept into the sea. There was too much debris and ice in the water to do a thorough search of the area. The Danish Navy searched some of the houses floating in the sea, but the four were never found. Several other villages were evacuated due to the ongoing threat of another tidal wave.

An organization in Europe was tracking this activity, but had no way of warning Greenland. The local church knows of the coming judgement upon sinners across the globe. How can they warn them? God has a plan in place to do just that: Missions! "Throw out the Lifeline!"





Yet Another Suicide

We arrived to our church building on a Sunday morning and saw an ambulance outside the neighbor's house. A few minutes later, the EMTs came out carrying a dead body on a stretcher. This image left a lasting impression on our children. Many times, our children had taken baked goodies to these neighbors. This lady had always been a happy outgoing person and we had just talked with her. She celebrated her 50th birthday the day before. **W**e are in a spiritual battle: A battle for the souls of men and women! The devil and this world have a stronghold on the hearts & minds of men and women. At times, it feels like the ministry here takes one-step forward and two steps back. The song, "Hold the Fort" seems so applicable. It feels we are simply holding the fort and waiting for the reinforcements to arrive. Yet we take comfort in the Glorious Light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, which still delivers people from the There is a woman darkness. who has been saved and desires to be baptized. We have been in Greenland for 10 years now and on the mission field for a total of 12 vears. We are STILL the ONLY Baptist missionaries in Greenland. Let that soak in for a moment! However, we do not want to leave the ministry unmanned for so long. **W**e are looking for some couples who would consider coming to stay in Greenland for a month at a time in order to watch over the ministry and building. They would have to pay their own airfare (which is expensive) and buy their own food, but everything else would be taken care of. Ministry

Suicide is an epidemic all across the Arctic. So many end their lives without any hope. In 2016, the number of suicides spiked in Greenland. The government, as in times past, scrambled to start more programs to help reduce suicides. It is the "same old, same old" which never actually addresses the root problem. We are here to bring hope to these souls. A man wanted to talk to us after the service one Sunday, but we were already counseling another couple. He eventually left and went home. I felt the LORD's leading to visit him. We did and we thank God, because he was contemplating suicide. We were able to encourage him and share with him God's love. The next day he stopped by to invite us to hold services in the government run nursing home where he works. The open doors and opportunities are endless. Last month, we began holding a midweek prayer meeting. Yesterday, 14 children attended Kunngip Klubbia, our weekly children's ministry. Now I am getting ready to head out the door to the local prison to hold a service there. Please pray for souls to be saved. Thank you for having a part in shining the glorious light of the Gospel of Jesus Christ in a dark place!



That Sinking Feeling

A town sewage pipe broke and the ensuing flood made its way downhill and straight to our church building. Since it wasn't affecting anyone else, no one did anything! When we arrived to the building, we thought it was a water main break. As I walked to the front door, my boots broke through the thin layer of ice & were immediately filled. It was then that my nostrils became filled with the stench & I knew it wasn't water! It was 20 below and it wasn't long before everything was frozen solid. Unfortunately, the raw sewage found its way under our church building and onto the cement floor. This is where we store things & have a little workshop. The ironic part is that our church building has a septic tank & therefore does not use the town's sewer lines. My son & I are trying to remove it while it is frozen & before it turns into a smellier mess!

Launching Out!

The Gospel Boat has landed in Ilulissat, Greenland & has been launched out into the deep! At one point, we thought we wouldn't even get the boat into the water this summer. shipping company decided to more than double the shipping price first quoted to us! They are the only shipping company here and have a monopoly on it. However, we did get the price lowered and thanks to your sacrificial giving, the Gospel Boat visited 3 new villages! Gospel tracts were distributed in each village!

How thankful we were to have Carole's Dad. Steve Nisslev with us for 9 weeks. He is the Captain of the Gospel Boat. He has now returned to the US and will be ordering parts for the boat to send over next year before summer. He is available to come and give you a firsthand account of the Boat Ministry. Challenges

The start-up of the boat ministry was not without its challenges & learning experiences. Here all boats are crane lifted in and out of the water. There are only a few limited dock places for boats our size and the cost is very high. There were no places available this year, so we had to find a place to anchor in the crowded harbor. We used a concrete block for our anchor. It worked well, but the only place to anchor was near the entrance of the harbor. We had smaller boats run right into our anchored boat!

One day a line got wrapped around our propellers and we couldn't sail anywhere. There are no dry suits in town and we couldn't just jump into the 30° water! With a little ingenuity, we clamped a knife onto a long pole and cut the line.

We had to use a small raft to get back and forth to our boat. The raft was "borrowed" many times and several times it was not returned! Praise God we were able to find it each time.

On another occasion, there was so much ice in the harbor that we could not sail through it. My son Christopher and I had to sit on the end of the boat with long poles and push the ice out of the way.

Being a Pioneer

We never knew what we were going to find in the different harbors. Gas stations close early in most villages, so it is important to plan ahead! Sometimes there were no docks and no places to tie up. At one place, we had to get close to the landing dock and climb up a 15 foot ladder. The smaller children and those of us that suffer from acrophobia did not like that.

Another time a huge fishing boat told us to move. They had no intention of waiting while we tried to get the engines started and warmed up. **W**e also had to learn to sail through icy waters, not simply ice, but icebergs! We were blessed this summer with less ice than usual. We purchased a GPS, but it did not always detail rocks and land hidden just under the surface of the water. This summer was certainly a

This summer was certainly a learning experience. The boat is now on land and winterized. However, we are already planning for next year and hoping to get an earlier start! We did have one motor lose a belt and overheat from time to time. Having two motors was sure a blessing! We had to sail home several times with only one running motor, but we never got stranded! Thank God for His safety & protection!

Boat Update

Thank you again for your prayers. Praise the LORD the boat cleared customs without any fees! We got the boat from the harbor today and it is now on land. That was an ordeal in and of itself. You cannot just put your boat anywhere in town. You must get permission from the local government. We thought we had that figured out, but we had to find a new spot at the last minute.

Next, we have to put the rudders and propellers back on, as well as some other details to get the boat ready for the water. Then a crane will put the boat in the water. Please pray everything goes as planned. We are tentatively hoping and praying to get the boat in the water early next week.

One step closer! As my father-in-law is learning on the pioneer mission field, nothing goes as planned or runs on our schedule. However, we are excited! Each day brings us one step closer to launching out into the deep!

Ministry Minutes

Just as the Bay is ever changing with its ebb and flow of ice, so is the ministry on this pioneer mission field. After a long & somewhat discouraging winter, spring has brought new life. The group of young kids that had been faithful for several years have reached the age of confirmation. The priestess from the state church teaches confirmation classes in the public school. As a result, most of these young teens have quit attending. Such is the battle against spiritual wickedness in high places. However, in the last month, our attendance has picked up considerably and our 300 square foot "auditorium" is too small. We live in our building. It is around 2,000 square feet. We are praying about moving out and opening up this building entirely for church use. Not only would provide great this church facilities in the Arctic, but we would also have room to house visitors and provide housing for future interns. Even since before coming to Greenland, we have had big plans & dreams, and it amazes us how God has continually done exceeding abundantly above all that we think! And just think...You all have had a part in this Pioneer Work!

The Boat is finally on its way to Greenland! We could not have done this without my father-inlaw's (Steve Nissley) help. He has spent lots of time, money and hard work in helping us get this ministry off the ground. The boat has been sitting in New Brunswick, Canada, a five hour drive from Bro. Nissley's house. He has made that drive countless times over the last 2 years in order to service and upkeep the boat. In addition, he has spent thousands of dollars on expenses for the boat. This past week, he prepared the boat for shipping and oversaw its delivery to the port in Halifax. **B**ro. Nissley will be arriving here in Greenland, the first week of July, when the boat is scheduled to arrive by ship. He is the captain of the Gospel boat and will be sailing it. He is committed to helping us with this ministry indefinitely. Pray as he will be sailing through ice as seen in the picture below. Our desire is to visit several villages this summer as the LORD wills, and as we learn how to navigate through these icy Arctic waters.

We have encouraged him on his return to the States September to visit any churches that want a firsthand report of this exciting new pioneer ministry.

February 2016

Ministry

One of the children that regularly comes to our services asked if her school class could come and interview the Baptist Church. As a result, others came out to visit our services.

We have been discipling a young convert. She has repeatedly asked to be baptized. We want her to be grounded in the Word before she takes this monumental step. Simply attending church here has caused grief in her home. She also wants her membership removed from the State Church. This is not a simple matter. Leaving the State Church is like the unpardonable sin; and in a small town like this, she will be ostracized by family & friends. In the local prison, there are several inmates that really desire to hear God's Word. One fellow asked what happens if he wants to be a Baptist after he is released from prison. He is from a small village that is as far north as you can go in Greenland and outside the reach of our boat ministry. How do you answer that question? It is not as simple as jumping in the car and driving there. There are no roads. To fly there from our town would cost around \$2,000. **W**e hope to have our boat up here by June and to start our

village outreach this summer.

Holding the Fort!

This past winter has been one of the loneliest that we have experienced vet. The fact that we are in this entire country all alone with the entire work on our shoulders can sometimes cause anxiety. There is no one to share this work with, no one that can relate to the difficulties of the languages, field and ministry, and no one that we can call upon in an emergency. We need permanent fellow laborers! We need a family to work alongside us, to share this burden with, and to pray and fellowship with on a daily basis. **W**e praise God for answering our prayers and calling the Wright family!!! They have just begun full-time deputation, leaving behind a secure job, steady income, their home and loved ones. Pray for them as they travel around the States and raise the needed support. This year it happened to fall on a Wednesday. The picture above was taken on "Sun Day" around 1:00 in the afternoon at the sun's peak. It was just last week that the sun was high enough in the sky to shine in our windows! What a joy it gives and what warmth it brings to the soul. North of us, other towns and villages are still awaiting the sun's return.

December 2015

This & That

A man walking in town fell over early one morning with a possible heart attack. A man in our church saw him and called the hospital. After a long wait, an "ambulance" finally arrived. There was only one "paramedic" and he forgot to bring a stretcher along. Our friend had to help get the man in the ambulance. Sadly, the injured man was pronounced dead upon arrival to the hospital.

Houng teens must move to another village in order to attend high school. Now that it is Christmas break, these teens have returned home and have nothing to do. Many cars have been stolen in town. The police warn that it is the owner's fault if the car is not locked and secured properly. When the temps are this low, folks keep their cars running all day. There is no where to take the car, so the young people just joy ride and ditch the car when they are done, sometimes literally in a ditch!

The government had a deficit this year, so they doubled the candy tax and made it retroactive. Now all the stores have to pay taxes on candy already sold and consumed! We are just thankful that they did not raise the income tax again!

A light that shineth...

We are now in the middle of our dark season. The sun set in November and will not rise until "Sun Day," January 13th. However, in order to actually see the return of the sun, one must climb the snow-covered mountain. The sun will rise and set in a 15 minute period. If the skies are cloudy, the long tiresome trek up the mountain and through the deep snow will have been in vain. In February, the sun will peak the mountains and the rays will light up the town!

The temperatures have been well below zero for the past month with temps as low as -30. The town's electricity has gone out several times this year during this dark period. What a blackness! No street lights or house lights, complete darkness. There are no trees here, thus no woodstoves. We have a furnace that burns diesel fuel, but needs electricity to run. One of the worst feelings in the Arctic is when the temperatures are -20 degrees and the electricity goes out. ©


This & That


Boat Ministry Update

This does not hinder the local fishermen, cruise ships, and tour operators from sailing. However, it does require one to be very cautious. Safety is a big priority and we will have all the necessary equipment before we begin.

We are still amazed at how God provided such a nice boat at such a great price. Thank you again for your generosity! Any extra funds received will go towards the operating and fuel costs of the boat ministry.

Prison Ministry

The prison recently lost one of its guards. He went fishing, and never returned. His relatives went searching for him along with the police and a rescue helicopter. Whale flesh was found in the motor of his splintered boat, but the body was lost at sea. Most likely, he hit a whale at high speed. The warden asked me to be available for the inmates, because they were greatly impacted by the death of this 35 year old guard. I preached on death and was able to give a clear presentation of the Gospel.



Sisimiut is the 2nd largest town in Greenland with a population around 6,000. The name means "the town by the foxholes." This town lies on the west coast about 40km north of the Arctic Circle. You have probably already guessed that fishing is the main industry. Sisimiut is also home to the Language Center. They teach Danish to Greenlanders and Greenlandic to foreigners. I have attended several of their courses, the most recent in May. As always, my soul is stirred and my heart is broken over yet another unreached town in Greenland. The time is short as the LORD's return is imminent, and yet there's still so much work to be done!



Aappilattoq ("the red mountain") is a small village located on the west coast of Greenland. There are around 200 souls living there. An inmate from this village was recently released and returned home. While in prison, this woman was very faithful & attentive to our services. We gave her a Bible & some study materials that I translated. This got her into the Bible. She told us that before we started coming, she never really thought much about God or had a desire to read the Bible, but now she enjoys reading it. She never liked going to the State Church, but has enjoyed services. She now our understands so much more about who God is and why Jesus Christ died on the cross. One day we will be able to visit her with the boat ministry. She is one of many with a similar testimony.

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A Brief Furlough

We are returning to the States for several weeks from late January to late March. apologize that our schedule is already booked and we are not able to visit all of you. SOON as we get permanent help on this Pioneer Mission Field, we will make plans to visit each of our supporting churches. We are so grateful for your understanding. have never met some of you, yet you support the work here. THANK YOU! Others of you, we have not seen for over a decade, yet you remain faithful to the work here. THANK YOU! QUJANARSUAQ!!!

It is always difficult to leave the work, but even more so when we are the ONLY Baptist missionaries here. The folks here need our constant care and encouragement. It is hard to leave without anyone to fill in. I told the warden that we were leaving for several weeks and that no one would be able to visit the prison in our place. He said, "It is very dreary news that you will be in America for such a long time. But we already look forward to your return to us." Another woman was tearfully asking Carole if we are coming back. She just recently made a profession of faith and really needs prayer & discipleship.



Got Snow?

It has been a cold and snowy winter so far. This year we have gotten more snow than ever before and it is ONLY January. The majority of our snowfall usually comes in March & April. In December we were hit with several consecutive blizzards with 65 mph wind gusts. It was so bad that the schools in town closed. One teacher told us that this was the first time in his 14 years here that the schools closed due to the weather. Of course, the airport was shut down for days. In a nearby village, 11 fishing boats sunk in the harbor due to the strong wind gusts.

Christopher Jr. and I have done a lot of shoveling. There is no where left to put the snow! Thankfully, the snowplows and dump trucks have begun removing the snow and dumping it into the Bay.

The Disko Bay

There are 12 villages located in the Disko Bay. Just south and north of the bay, there are another 13 villages. That's 25 towns and villages that can easily be reached with this boat ministry. That is 1/3 of Greenland! If we venture further north, there are another 10 villages that can reached. In these 35 villages, there are only 4 runways. That means the other 31 villages can ONLY be reached by boat. These are exciting times to be involved pioneer missions Greenland is a wide-open pioneer mission field!

Darkness

This morning the sun rose around 11:00 and will set at 2:00 in the afternoon. We will continue to lose 12 minutes of sunlight each day until November 29th when the sun sets for the year.

A few weeks ago, someone tried to steal our car. The door was open, the radio was on the seat with wires still attached, and there was a key broken in the ignition. But Praise the LORD there was no real damage done!

As the darkness settles in, the problems in this society are more clearly seen (i.e. domestic violence, drunkenness, child abuse, theft, etc.).

Boat Ministry

Because of your generosity, we were able to purchase a boat! It is currently sitting in Canada. Our captain Steve Nissley plans to get the boat out in the Canadian/American waters this spring. Once he has a feel for the boat and has purchased all the necessary equipment, we will then ship it to Greenland.

One of the most productive glaciers in the world empties into our bay. As a result, the Disko Bay is full of icebergs year round, so caution must be used as one navigates through the ice fields, even in summer.

Steve Nissley is committed to helping us for the next three years as we get this ministry up and running. With his help, I will be able to continue preparing sermons, translating materials, etc. We are praying that the LORD raises up another family to help in this ministry.

We have named our boat, The

Gospel. We can't wait to take the Gospel to these many unreached villages!

When they get to the end of the road, they will have memorized 11 verses. Each child will then receive a Greenlandic Bible. One Bible costs around \$60.00. Each week we plan one activity with the children. Sometimes it is simply playing games. Other times it involves a craft. No matter what, we use every opportunity to share the Gospel. They make lots of food and cakes and invite everyone they know. Since the houses are small, not everyone shows up at the same time. Neither does anyone stay very long. You must eat quickly to make room for the next guests. It is a great way to make friends

and to try the local cuisine.

Carole's mom went home to be with the LORD in August. Susie's Godly legacy lives on in her children and grandchildren who are all serving the LORD. Thank you for the letters, emails, phone calls and prayers during this time. We thank the LORD that He made it possible for Carole to return to the States for the funeral and memorial services. She was also able to spend some needed time with her family.
